Art Club

Meetings held twice per month starting in the fall

Cost: \$5 membership dues

French Club

Meetings held usually monthly.

Cost; \$5.00 per year

French club or le cercle de français as we like to call it is an extremely popular club at Northview that combines the French culture and language with exciting, fun activities, games, movies and more! And of course, there is always beaucoup food! It allows students of all ages to meet each other, make friends, and have a great time, while learning about French culture. We usually have about one activity a month such as tie-dying T-shirts, caroling at the zoo in December, our Progressive Dinner highlighting la cuisine française, watching movies and celebrating holidays! Our advisors is Kim Gogel who do a wonderful job guiding our club. We meet once in the beginning of the year to select officers and then after that, the officers have a meeting once a month to discuss and plan upcoming events. The cost is five dollars to help fund our activities. Our club is open to everyone including students who do not take French, but are interested in the French culture and students can join anytime throughout the year. German Club

Meetings held once a month, depending on activities.

Cost: nominal

Looking for a fun, active and friendly club to join, with lots of exciting activities and free food? German Club has all this and more. With parties and other activities nearly every month, German Club should definitely be one club you decide to join. During the fall you can look forward to picnics with cool activities, such as Frisbee, dress up games, three-legged races, and other new games you might not have heard of. Also in the fall is the Oktoberfest, one big Halloween party! Not only do you get to dress up and get judged, you also get to paint pumpkins, bob for apples, and other activities, all for awesome prizes!

During the winter, there isn't much you can do outside but that doesn't stop German Club! This season our main event is caroling at the zoo with the other foreign language clubs. Not only do we get to see the animals and lights, we also get in free. The spring provides warmer weather for us to enjoy the outdoors, which means more picnics and other random outdoor activities. If you aren't taking German this year, that's not a problem! Taking German is not required in order to join this splendid club.

Harry Potter Club

Meeting held: Meetings will be announced and held after school.

Students interested in the series of books by K. Rowling meet monthly to discuss the books and participate in Harry Potter activities. Some of these may include trivia games, Hogwarts conversations and special workshops. This club is open to all students.

Literary Club

Cost: Free

Lit Mag came together a few years ago to acknowledge students in art and literature. Each of the poems, short stories, and pieces of artwork submitted are all creations of some of Northview's most talented students. Lit Mag releases one magazine a year around the time year books are given out. The magazine is created by the students making it original. Each submission that is entered to the magazine by the students is what truly makes Lit Mag unique.

Math Club

Meetings held monthly after school.

Cost: none

Northview's Math Club is centered on involving students in mathematics outside of their usual math classes. We do this through two main avenues, the annual *JETS* competition and monthly Math Club Problems. *JETS* is basically an engineering competition held in the spring at The University of Toledo. Teams of 5 to 8 students compete against other area teams with the opportunity to reach state and national competitions. On a broader level, the Math Club Problems are non-standard problems (they might make you think a little more than usual!) published each month as a competition. They are available for all Northview students and anyone correctly solving any of the problems is then entered into a drawing for prizes at the end of the year. Math Club members are given first priority when it comes to forming the *JETS* teams and they also help determine suitability of solutions for the monthly problems.

Mock Trial

Mock trial is a simulated trial competition among high school students. It allows students to "role play" different parts of a court case. The team breaks up into prosecution and defense sections and then into attorneys and witnesses. After coming up with our own plans and cases, we go up

against other schools and their teams. Our “trials” take place in actual courtrooms in front of panels of judges and lawyer. These competitions are on a local, state and national level, advancing with a “win”. Our team usually meets about once a week.

National Honor Society

Meetings are held monthly second Friday of the month at 7:00 a.m.

Cost: none

National Honor Society is a service group that is involved with activities that benefit the school and community. NHS organizes the NV American Red Cross Blood Drive, Halloween Fun Fest, and helps with the 8th Grade Open House. Students receive an invitation for membership if they meet the criteria of leadership, service, scholarship, and character during the spring of their junior year. The scholarship qualification is a 3.5 GPA through the spring of 2003. Beginning in 2004, this requirement will increase to a 3.75 GPA. Meetings are held on the second Friday of each month in the Commons.

Paw Pride (P²)

Meetings are held usually every Friday for one hour.

Cost: none

Paw Pride is a group of sophomores, juniors and seniors who meet to promote pride and spirit throughout Northview. Paw Pride attempts to recognize groups and individuals who are sometimes overlooked by making banners to commend them. Sophomores are nominated in the fall by their teachers. Then there is an interview process and five new sophomores are added each year. The members remain anonymous until the Senior Breakfast held in the late spring of senior year when their identities are revealed. People who are spirited and creative are assets to this group.

Peace Club

Meetings held the first Monday of each month at 2:35 in G9. Time commitment depends on student involvement.

Peace Club is a volunteer club dedicated to service and international understanding. The goal of Peace Club is to make students aware of the various community service programs available, so they can give back to the community. We meet once a month to discuss group activities and members are encouraged to participate in individual activities as often as possible. You are able to join this group at anytime.

Quiz Bowl

Meetings held in G4, typically one hour practice on Tuesdays and Thursdays. We have seven three-way matches on Mondays from October until February.

Cost: see advisor

From students who just can't miss an episode of Jeopardy, to students who just seem to know everything about music or sports, Quiz Bowl is for you. The club competes with other local high schools, much like on Jeopardy. But instead of one on one action, this “sport” pits two teams of four against each other. The teams use their buzzers to ring in with the answer to a trivia question, before the other team can. Questions can be about almost anything. Common question subjects include fine art, literature, math, politics, history, geography, and pop culture. Everyone is guaranteed to know at least some answers. The club hosts tournaments and also travels to other high school tournaments. In the past, the club has also gone to larger tournaments at The Ohio State University, and The University of Michigan. But don't be intimidated by the big names and math questions, Quiz Bowl can be fun for anyone.

Robotics

Meetings held once a week in fall with increasing time based on competitions.

Cost: \$350 offset by fundraising

Robotics is a club that strives to inspire young people with an appreciation of science and technology and an understanding that mastering these can enrich the lives of all. In Robotics, students work together to build a robot for a specific competition, with the game format changing every season. The production of a robot from start to finish is an exciting process that aids in the development of teamwork. Each person works on a different part, and like a puzzle, the parts fit together to complete the picture. The students involved in Robotics meet on a varying schedule based on the deadlines of the competition. . For most of the year students meet once a week for a couple of hours. However, during the actual “season” (which lasts from January through February) the team meets for approximately 12 – 20 hours per week, usually during two school nights and most of the day on Saturday. From September through December students are given numerous chances through fundraisers to earn the \$350 needed to be a part of the Robotics Team. This money is used for parts for the robot, travel expenses to two competitions, food, spirit wear, etc. However, the bulk of the money needed to compete in our two regional events and to run the team throughout the year is donated by the DANA Corporation. There are 5 advisors from DANA, adult advisors from area businesses, parent volunteers, as well as Mr. Andy Roth, a chemistry teacher at Northview. Most new team members join during May and June so that they can go through training exercises over the summer. Any student who is interested in joining is more than welcome to come and see Mr. Roth in room D-10 at any point during the school year.

Northview Rocket Club

Meetings held once a week in the fall with time increasing based on competitions.

Cost: None for general members; \$200 for TARC members which can be offset by fundraising

The Northview Rocket Club will design and build model rockets capable of launching to altitudes of 2000 feet with safe recovery. Members of the club may volunteer to join a sub-group that will compete in the Team America Rocket Challenge (TARC). This competition requires students to design and build a rocket to carry a specific payload to a pre-determined altitude and stay aloft for a prescribed time (just like a NASA project). Finals competition will take place near Washington D.C. Prizes will be awarded to top teams.

For most of the year all members will meet once a week for two hours. The students involved in TARC rocketry will meet on a varying schedule based on deadlines for the competition. During the building season (which lasts from January through May) the TARC team will meet for approximately 10 to 15 hours per week, usually during two school nights and half days on Saturday. From September through December TARC members are given numerous chances through fundraisers to earn their \$200 needed to finance the team. The remainder of funds needed will be sought through grants and/or donations from area businesses. Mr. Schwerkolt is the advisor and located at Northview in Room E-20.

Science Olympiad

Meetings: every Friday after school

Cost: \$5 dues

Science Olympiad is a National Competition designed to test students in all science areas in ways that are challenging and fun. At each event the team competes in 23 events ranging from Astronomy and Herpetology tests to Chemistry and Physics labs as well as building bridges and mousetrap vehicles. Our season starts at the end of October and lasts through the end of April and students of all grade levels are invited to join. So if

you love science, no matter what type, or simply love to problem solve or build, Science Olympiad is the team for you. Please contact Mr. Roth in room D-10 if you have any questions.

Spanish Club

Meetings are held once a month in F8.

Cost: Small fee to cover activities set each year.

Spanish club is a wonderful opportunity to meet other students and further ones knowledge about Spanish culture by participating in Spanish related activities. There is a social activity once a month, sometimes short and informational or at times longer due to the planning of an activity. All information is posted on a Spanish bulletin board outside of Senora Monday's classroom. Monthly activities are planned by the group which has included: eating out at a local Mexican restaurant, watching movies in Spanish with English subtitles, decorating sugar skulls to celebrate the Spanish holiday Dia de los Muertos, making carnival masks, Salsa Dance lessons, caroling in Spanish at the "Lights before Christmas", and breaking a piñata just before final exams. Spanish club is fun and entertaining; anyone interested is encouraged to join.

Speech and Debate

Do you enjoy stating your opinion? Do you like to argue? Do you like to act? Do you like to work with other students and meet interesting new friends? If you answered "yes" to any of the above, Speech and Debate is for you. This activity is a lot of fun. Throughout the year we travel to schools across the state to compete. There are over ten separate categories to compete in, so there is a spot for everyone. Speech and Debate has a long history of success at Northview High School. Last year we sent seven students to the state championship and three students to Nationals. For over thirty years we have been helping students become leaders in the community. Students that have participated in Speech and Debate have used this program to prepare for college. In fact, universities often consider membership in a speech and debate program in their selection process.

Student Government

Meetings usually held twice per month at 7:00 a.m.

Cost: none

The Northview Student Government is one of the largest and most influential organizations at our school. With over 85 students involved, this group not only helps shape and influence school policy, but we also raise money for area charities, stage assemblies, put on school dances and generally try to make Northview a school that you are proud to attend. We hold elections in the spring semester, with addition elections for freshman and appointment of cabinet members in the fall. This is a group that you can get involved in as soon as you enter Northview, so get involved! Current advisors are Mr. Jay Ackerman and Mrs. Brienne Laskey.

Table Tennis Club

Matches held once a week.

Cost: none

The Table Tennis Club is one of the newest clubs at Northview. Started by a few students last year, the Table Tennis Club is one of the largest, most active clubs in the school. We get together once a week and play table tennis for about an hour and a half. We made a parliament to make sure the club runs smoothly and things get done. We have an end of the season tournament and our season runs from October through February. We vary from a variety of skill levels, so it doesn't matter if you are good or not at table tennis. Our goal in starting the Table Tennis Club was to let students come relax and have a good time. We welcome the class of 2009 to Northview and hope to see you next year.

Thespians

Meetings held 1st Wednesday of the month

Cost: \$25.00 when inducted

Thespian membership is limited to members of the student body who have accumulated enough points in theatre activities to become a member of The International Thespian Society. After accumulating 10 points (approximately 100 hours) in high school theatre work (performance and technical), members are inducted. This exclusive group goes to a state conference each year, participates in local community theatre, and participates in activities with drama club and Northview Theatre. Whispering Wildcats

Meetings: Once or twice prior to each season

Cost: None

Whispering Wildcats membership is limited to senior girls. The club supports boys athletics through material gifts in the form of spirit and nutritional items. Each student sponsors one or more senior boy to support.

CO-CURRICULAR Class Activities

Business Professionals

This co-curricular club is for all students enrolled in the Business Technology, Interactive Media programs. Our motto is “Today’s students, Tomorrow’s Business Professionals”. Business Professionals of America has a history as a student organization that contributes to the preparation of a world-class workforce through the advancement of leadership, citizenship, academic and technological skills for students at the secondary and the postsecondary level. Through co-curricular programs and services, members of Business Professionals of America compete in demonstrations of their business technology skills, develop their professional and leadership skills, network with one another and professionals across the nation, and get involved in the betterment of their community through good works projects.

Cosmetology

The Cosmetology Program is a two-year program that provides students the opportunity to become licensed cosmetologists. Students meet in the COS lab attached to the cafeteria for three periods to do both lab work and book work. After becoming proficient in a variety of cosmetology skills, students are able to take the Ohio State Board of Cosmetology examination to obtain

their cosmetology license. A student successfully completing this two-year program will be prepared for the following positions: cosmetologist, receptionist, nail technician, product sales representative, color technician, skin care specialist, retail manager, salon owner, and demonstration/platform artist. Cosmetology is a career of a lifetime. It gives students a chance to explore the many different avenues of a career that is as diverse as it

is creative. The skills taught in the Cosmetology Program will help students succeed in whatever path they choose for their future.

DECA Distributive Education Clubs of America

DECA is an organization for students enrolled in Marketing Education and is designed to promote a total program of activities, which develops leadership and individual growth. DECA is the only national youth organization operating in the nation's schools to attract young people to careers in marketing and management. All students enrolled in Marketing Education Programs become members of DECA on a local, state and national level. Each chapter elects its own officers with the marketing Education teacher serving as Chapter Advisor. These chapters in turn comprise the Ohio DECA Association. Each chapter, as well as the state association, is self-supporting with membership dues and fund-raising projects on a local level. DECA offers Marketing Education students the opportunities that a civic or profession organization would offer a businessperson. Activities provide an education program in the development of leadership ability, professional attitudes, better citizenship characteristics and social growth of the individual. DECA activities serve as a teaching tool by creating interest in marketing and management as related to the member's career interest.

FCCLA Family Community and Caregivers Leaders of America

FCCLA is a national student organization for those in the Career Tech Early Childhood Education Program. In addition to having field experience in early childhood classrooms, involvement in this program offers the students the opportunity to develop leadership skills for a future career in education. Involvement in FCCLA also extends into the community as we perform community service projects. Some projects have included adopting families during the holiday season, volunteering in the community and planning a family fun night for parents and their preschool children. Meetings are held on Fridays during class hours.

FFA Future Farmers of American

The Northview FFA is part of the National FFA and is open to all students enrolled in an Agricultural or Environmental class. Students that take part in these classes are able to compete in contests about what they learn in class such as soils, nature, water quality, and many other aspects. Students may also attend chapter meetings, district activities, state and national conventions and a summer FFA camp. Many opportunities are open to students enrolled in these classes, it's also a great way to meet new people and learn new things.

Med Tech

As a student in the Medical Technology class in your Junior or Senior year, you will also become a member of Med Tech VICA. As a group you attend field trips, have guest speakers that relate to what you are learning about in Med Tech. We volunteer our time to the community and plan many exciting fundraisers. VICA is a national organization that provides quality education experiences for students in leadership, teamwork and character development.

Newspaper/Yearbook

Meet - during school as a class

Time Commitment - during and after school as needed

Cost - free, but students are required to sell advertising

Joining Dates - Application go out at the end of January and students must go through an interview process. Both of these organizations are open to any student after having completed the pre-requisite journalism classes. Applications are taken in the spring for the following year's staff. We write articles, layout pages, sell advertising, and more. The articles cover both Northview and national news. It's tons of fun and a great way to meet new people. Mrs. Flynn is the advisor for both groups.

FEA Ohio Future Educators of America

Cost: none

Are you interested in becoming a teacher for your future career? If you are then come and join OFEA. This is a club that gives you a deeper perspective on teaching. Our advisor is Mrs. Wanda Snyder, a teacher at Northview High School. We discuss activities and projects such as “Top Turkey Teacher” and the “Penny War” held in February. We also do activities to thank our teachers and build school spirit. Even if you are just experimenting in different careers and you think teaching is a possibility OFEA is an energetic, fun, enlightening, and enthusiastic club. Come join our club and you’ll be sure to have a great time.

Skills USA VICA Vocational Industrial Club of American

Students have the opportunity to join a student leadership organization that serves youths enrolled in trade, industrial, technical, and health occupation programs through local, state, and national activities. The organization is called VICA or Vocational Industrial Clubs of America. The organization affords students the opportunity to become involved in civic, educational and social activities. It also allows for personal development, the respect for dignity of work and democratic action. Students have the opportunity to develop their fullest potential in leadership, citizenship, and character. VICA emphasizes respect for the dignity of work, high ethical standards, quality, scholarship, and safety. As a VICA member, students will develop into well rounded people with social and leadership abilities as well as occupational skills. VICA instills spirit and a desire to learn, to grow, and to become a productive citizen.

Video Production

Interactive Media is a two year program that includes video production, Web design, digital photography, photo manipulation, animation, and graphics. Students produce products including video slide shows, video projects, Web pages, advertisements, and photography projects. Students in Interactive Media may earn up to 18 college credits through articulation agreements. They also participate in competitions such as Business Professionals of America and the Tech Prep Showcase. Interactive Media students are involved in the community through many of their client based projects. Students plan and conduct a summer computer camp for 5th – 8th graders called Cyber Camp.

BAND, CHOIR AND ORCHESTRA

Band

Prerequisites: A minimum of one year of band experience or permission of the band director.

The Northview Band program provides the student with a wide variety of musical experiences. All students enrolled in band perform with the marching band during the first quarter of the school year. At the conclusion of the fall marching season the band will be divided into three concert bands. Students will be placed in one of the three concert bands based on an audition held in January or February of the previous year. The concert bands will present a number of formal concerts each year as well as participate in Ohio Music Education Association Adjudicated Events. Students are also provided the opportunity for small ensemble and solo performances. All band students also perform at winter sports events as a member of the pep band. The pep band performs at every home boys basketball game, one girls basketball game, and one hockey game. The pep band also performs at pep assemblies throughout the year.

Band Auxillary

Prerequisite: Acceptance is based on the tryout

The band auxiliary consists of the Northview flag corps and majorettes. Tryouts are held in the spring of each year. This course is for those students who do not play a band instrument.

Orchestra

Prerequisite: A minimum of one year of orchestra experience or permission of the orchestra director

Orchestra is a performing organization comprised of students who have demonstrated proficiency on a stringed instrument. The primary goal of orchestra is to cultivate an enjoyment and higher understanding of orchestral music by studying music of various styles, music theory, and technical drills. These efforts culminate by presenting several successful concerts throughout the year. Highlights of the year are the December concert, State Orchestra Adjudicated Event, and the May Pops Concert. There are many opportunities for additional enrichment and service, such as Solo and Ensemble contest and select orchestras at the district, regional, state, and national levels.

Symphony Orchestra

Woodwind, brass, and percussion players, as selected by the directors, add to the orchestra strings to form a full symphony orchestra. The Symphony Orchestra performs two concerts during the year, as well as at the senior awards assembly and graduation.

Jazz Band

Prerequisite: Enrollment in High School Band or by permission of the director.

The Jazz Band is a musical group organized to study and perform the various styles of jazz music, such as Big Band Dance Music, Pop and Rock, Ballads and Blues, and small group jazz. A basic understanding of improvisational techniques is also given. The Jazz Band performs a number of times throughout the school year. Practices will be conducted after school hours.

Choirs

The Northview Choral Music Program has enjoyed a long reputation of musical excellence in the state of Ohio. Students have the opportunity to perform a wide variety of choral music in the most beautiful settings available. Incoming freshman are placed into one of two **Symphonic Choirs** or **Northview Women's Chorus**. These choirs sing music of beginning to intermediate difficulty. The **A Cappella Choir** performs some of the most challenging choral literature available, and is open to juniors and seniors only. Every other year, the A Cappella Choir travels to New York City for a concert tour. In February 2004, the A Cappella Choir appeared on the NBC Today Show! **The Harmony Road Show, Solo & Ensemble, and Barbershop Quartets** provide a diverse singing opportunity for choir members.
